Semester 1 reports

Parents are reminded the drop zone on Terrigal Drive is the best place to drop off and pick up your child. There is no safe place to drop students on Charles Kay Drive.


Farewell Mr Marchant


Students then went on to create a photographic image that is an appropriation (a reconstruction) of a famous work by a famous historic painter.
