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Principals Report

Another great term with many highlights and personal best achievements across all facets of the school. I would like to thank the students and parents and carers for their continued support and commitment to success at Terrigal High School. I would like to thank the entire staff for their ability to respond to the growing changes and demands placed upon them each year. Our students are able to experience many opportunities due to the dedication of the staff.

I would like to congratulate Mr Mitch Baty on gaining a permanent Mathematics appointment to Terrigal High School. Mitch went through a rigorous and competitive interview process to gain selection and we are fortunate to secure his services for many years to come.

We are still awaiting upon DoE staffing to finalise decisions in relation to the vacant Head Teacher English position. We thank Deanne McIntosh for acting in this position. Dr Stephen Nugent remains on leave at the moment and Nicholas Staniford remains relieving as Head Teacher Science leading into Term 3. Vikki Austin will remain as relieving Year 12 Year Advisor. Dylan Parbery is currently relieving as Head Teacher HSIE with Katie Allen relieving as Year 10 Year Advisor. I would like thank Amanda Surva for her very caring nature whilst relieving as Year 8 Year Advisor. She did a tremendous iob and Tom O'Rourke will return to the role in Term 3.

It is with great sadness that we farewell Janet Westerdyke from Terrigal High School. Janet has been associated with the school for the past 25 years, firstly as a parent before spending the past 13 years as a Student Support Learning Officer. We thank you very much for the care and support that you have provided the students, staff and community of Terrigal High School over the years.

The building works forecasted for completion at the end of the school holidays now look like

continuing early into Term 3 due to the recent weather. DoE School infrastructure are replacing the roof and skylights of half the school. This is a massive undertaking and will benefit the school both aesthetically but also secure the buildings from the weather.

On any given school day in NSW there are approximately 80,000 students absent from school. One day absence per week equates to 250 lost hours to learning each year. When this translates to actual learning activities within the class room, those lost hours make the continuity of learning very difficult for students and perpetuates the issues. I am asking for the support of all parents and carers in monitoring the attendance of your child. The school deems 90% and above attendance to be an acceptable level (considering illness). This equates to approximately 16 days absence per year. As part of the new attendance procedures we will be acknowledging and rewarding students at the end of each term that have gained 90% or higher.

The parent teacher meetings for Years 7-10 will occur on Wednesday 21st July from 4pm -8:30pm. After receiving parental feedback from we will return to 5-minute face to face meetings for the evening. Due to the Covid restrictions and the Trial HSC we will be holding these meetings in the Library and some of our classrooms. Booking details will become available shortly.

Our Mid-Year Academic Awards will occur on Wednesday 14th July in the school hall. The ceremony for Years 7, 9, 11 will commence at 9:30am. The ceremony for Years 8, 10, 12 will follow, commencing at 11:45am. Parents and carers of award recipients have been emailed an invitation to attend.

Celebrating Attendance

Attendance has been a focus for all school across the State this year including at Terrigal. Mr Staniford has been working hard to keep everyone in class whilst I have been monitoring for students who have falling attendance.

The Department of Education and NESA push for students to have attendance rates above 85%. However, at Terrigal High we have decided to celebrate those students who are always with us. We are going to be celebrating attendance rates above 90%.

In Term Two alone, the number of students who have attendance of 90% or greater grew by 5% on the Term One attendance figures. Congratulations!!!

To celebrate, at our first full school assembly back next term there are going to be some prizes for our over 90% students. There will be one set of Air pods raffled which any student with an attendance rate of over 90% will have the chance to win regardless of year group. There will also be six \$10.00 canteen vouchers per year group will be raffled off for students who have an attendance rate of over 90%.

School Attendance is so important and to emphasise this point, we intend on repeating the prize draw in Terms Three and Four.

Keep up the good work, keep attending school and remember that everyday counts!

Below is a figure that looks at % attendance per school year and equates that to lessons missed.

This is an amazing opportunity for students looking to do Medicine!






Central Coast Joint Medical Program Information Session Webinar
