Attendance Letters

As a school we are required to let parents know when their child's attendance rate falls below 90% whether the absence is explained or not. We understand that due to COVID and Influenza A, many students have had more time away from school than previously, meaning that many parents have received the official letter for the first time. This letter is the first step in a process of monitoring attendance and as time goes on many students are now above 90% attendance. At any time, parents are able to log into the <u>Parent Portal</u> to see the attendance data for their child or children.

SOLO Taxonomy

The structure of observed learning outcomes (SOLO) is a framework that describes how we learn new things. Initially we know nothing, then learn several relevant things (Multi-structural). The next stage is when we see how the relevant knowledge relate to each other (Relational) and the last stage is when we can see how the related things can apply to new situations about any topic (Extended abstract).

A woodwork example helps to explain the different stages of learning. The first stage is learning about the different types of ways we can cut and join wood. The relational stage is when we follow instructions to cut and join the wood to make a table. The extended abstract is when students are able to create their own table with intricate design elements, without instructions. This Term teachers are using SOLO taxonomy to differentiate success criteria within the classroom.


Dear Valued Customers,
